

"Up on the Housetop" is a Christmas song written by Benjamin Hanby in 1864. It has been recorded by a multitude of singers, most notably Gene Autry in 1953. "Up on the Housetop" is the second-oldest secular Christmas song, outdone only by "Jingle Bells", was written in 1857.

In Matthew Chapter 10, we see Jesus sending his disciples out to evangelize and share his good news. He gives them many instructions and warns them that not everyone will be receptive. But then he says: 'So have no fear of them; for nothing is covered up that will not be uncovered, and nothing secret that will not become known. What I say to you in the dark, tell in the light; and what you hear whispered, proclaim from the housetops. --Matthew 10:26-27

Housetops...actually, Rooftops... were places of great activity in Bible times. The high, open, flat surfaces were perfect for winnowing chaff from grain, drying fruit, storing grain, nuts, and fruit, and sun-bleaching laundry.

Rooftops were also household gathering places because so much work was done there, and they were sleeping places on the hot nights of summer. And because of their height, their openness, and frequent assemblies of people, rooftops were great places from which to shout the news.

Today Jesus still instructs us: "What I say to you in the dark, tell in the light; and what you hear whispered, proclaim from the housetops." The good news he wants us to shout and share with other people is far better than any gifts that Santa Claus brings down through the chimney to us! It's about his "Christmas gifts" of love and life — God's love

and through Jesus, our life!



What's YOUR "House Top" or "Rooftop"? It might not be a literal one. But from where can YOU "shout the news" about Jesus? Might be virtual...on the phone...text messages...emails...in stores while you're shopping. Find a creative way of sharing Jesus' Christmas Joys with all of God's children --God's beloved "Little Ones"—that you can! Oh-oh-oh! I think you'll even make Santa Claus happy!






The Martin Luther Church WEEKLY BIBLE STUDY IS MEETING EACH


December 4th 12:00 PM Station 13 358 Folly Road





In 1957 Frances Kipps Spencer developed the idea of crafting chrismons for Christmas trees at Ascension Lutheran Church in Danville, Virginia. More than simple decorations for the trees that enhance the sanctuary during the holiday season, chrismons have meanings that allow those who understand these symbols to consider the history, heritage, and basic tenets of the Christian faith. The following paragraphs will help you "read" the chrismons that we all enjoy.

The cross is a symbol that all Christians understand, but there are many forms of the cross. The Latin cross takes the form of the cross that is above the altar in the sanctuary of Martin Luther Lutheran Church. The Greek cross has arms of equal length. The Tau cross looks like the capital letter "T."

A cross on a sphere, or orb, has a meaning that is distinct from that of a single cross. The orb symbolizes the world, so an orb with a cross surmounting it symbolizes the Church triumphant on the earth. Images of Christ holding the orb and cross, both as a child and as an adult, are common.



After the cross, perhaps the most familiar of the ancient symbols among the chrismons is the fish. Even children know that it refers to Christ, who fished among men to gather up and save their souls. The Greek spelling of the word "fish" is *IXOYC*. These letters are an acronym (in Greek) for Jesus Christ, Son of God, the Savior. In Roman catacomb paintings one can find images of a fish with a loaf of bread. These images refer both to the miracle of the loaves and the fishes and to the Eucharist.

The triangle or a group of three intersecting circles represent the triune God. These ancient symbols recall one of the basic elements of the Christian faith.

Letters themselves are symbols among the chrismons. IHS (or IHC) are the first three letters of the Greek spelling of Jesus, *IHSUS*. Throughout history, some images of Constantine the Great have depicted his soldiers with these letters on their shields. The Emperor had a vision in which he heard a voice saying "*In hoc signo vinces*"—"In this sign you shall conquer"—on the night before a great battle. He placed the sign of Christ on his soldiers' shields and was victorious the next day. The IHS on the soldiers' shields is a monogram for Christ, not an abbreviation of the prophetic words Constantine heard in his vision.

Another letter symbol is XP or XPI, the first letters of the Greek word *XPICTOC*, Christ. If one reads XP backward, one also finds an abbreviation for the Latin word *pax*, peace.

The Greek letters A (alpha) and Ω (omega) may appear in various ways on chrismons. In particular, one often sees them hanging from the arms of a cross.

These are just a few of the symbols one may find among the chrismons on the trees in the sanctuary at Martin Luther Lutheran Church. Enjoy both their beauty and their meaning as you approach the altar this year!
