

In the midst of a Civil War, Abraham Lincoln called on the nation to pause for a day of national "Thanks Giving." Many would say this was the worst time to give thanks. Everything was falling apart around him. Yet he knew instinctively that this was a way to begin healing our nation's old wounds. It was a way to turn the focus off what was wrong with our country and onto what was good about it.

Clayton A. Lord, Jr. says: "Even today, in a society that is more secular than religious, Thanksgiving reminds us of what we have and who gave it to us. It helps us to focus on our blessings. We need to do that because we can easily get swept away by a flood of advertising reminding us of what we don't have."

St. Paul tells us in his letter to the Philippians that he has found the secret to contentment. He says, "I have learned to be content whatever the circumstances. I know what it is to be in need, and I know what it is to have plenty. I have learned the secret of being content in any and every situation, whether well fed or hungry, whether living in plenty or in want. I can do everything through him who gives me strength."

Clayton A. Lord, Jr. reminds us: "Paul's happiness comes from knowing and serving Jesus. Paul can be happy in prison because he knows God is with him. He can be happy even though he has been thrown overboard and has lost every material thing he owns, because he still has a purpose for his life. If he ties his future to Christ, then he knows he will come out the victor."

Most likely we will not be thrown overboard and lose every material thing we own. It happens, and did in the recent hurricane that hit Puerto Rico and Florida, and in other natural disasters. But most of the time, we won't physically suffer that kind of loss. However, when life gets rough, as it is for many of us right now, we may feel that way psychologically and emotionally.

So we need to practice both Thanksgiving and Thanksliving! Look carefully for God's blessings! Find them...See them...and Share them with other people every day. Encourage each other to give God thanks for all of the blessings he gives us. That's a sure way to help each other be happy in God and Jesus each and every day!

This project is called "The Veteran Suicide Awareness Tree" or THE WITTING TREE.

November 1st – 11th, 2022

The Witting Tree is a silent, faith-filled witness observed each day for eleven days,

from November 1 through November 11 (Veterans Day).

The term "witting" means to be cognizant, deliberate, and aware to the facts of a situation. Each year, more than a dozen faith communities and organizations join in hosting a Witting Tree ceremony at their sites.

We have participated in the Witting Tree project by hanging 22 sets of dog tags each day on a tree in our church side yard (near our sign on Martello Drive) in public remembrance of 22 veterans who take their lives each day by suicide. (That is one Veteran that takes their life every 80 minutes.)





Vicki, my dear wife and mother of my children, left this earth to be with our Heavenly Father on February 21 of this year. It has been a difficult six months since then. Something very interesting and impactful happened to me a few days ago related to my "journey through grief". My mom went to her Heavenly Home in 2014 at the age of 93. For the last few years of her life, "she lived with Vicki and me in our home on James Island. When we moved her from Texas to James Island, we put most of her possessions in storage. About a month, ago, I started going through the numerous totes containing her papers and discovered a cardboard box with the following

hand-written notation on it — "Sonny's Letters." "Sonny" is the nickname given to me by my mom and dad. The box contained 43 letters written to me by Vicki before we were married. We started dating early in 1964 while she was still in high school. I was in my first year of college. After she graduated in 1965, she began working for Gracie

Title Company in Austin, TX. She and her friend, Shirley, shared a small rental house in Austin. I was going to college in San Marcos, TX (40 miles south of where Vicki lived) and working on weekends in Round Rock, TX (20 miles north of where she lived). Needless-to-say, my travel to and from work on weekends included stopovers to visit Vicki in Austin. The letters in the box that I found spanned the period, July 1965 - April 1966 (we were married in May 1966). This amounted to 43 letters over 10 months or just over 1 letter a week. She liked writing letters. Me not so much. The first thing that struck me was that I did not know any of these letters still existed. The second thing was that there were so many of them. The third thing was that I really had very little memory of what was in them. The fourth thing that struck me was the 5-cent first class stamp on each one. I put the box aside. Over the next few weeks, I would bring out the box, think about reading the letters, but then put the box back. I was not sure that I could read any of them without breaking down. Finally, a few days ago, I got up the courage to tackle the task. I did break down a few times, but the experience was amazing and well worth it. I am very glad that I decided to read them when I did. I started reading the letters in sequence from oldest (July

1, 1965) to most recent (April 13, 1966). I continued reading into the evening hours and something amazing happened. I started having memories that I did not know were still in my brain. Not vague fuzzy memories, but very vivid memories that were as crystal clear as if they were from yesterday. Every letter was full of her love and support for me. I started remembering things that I had forgotten decades ago. Not just people and events, but things such as our little arguments and follow-up apologies (we were working toward saving for our wedding and planning as to how we were going to afford being married while I was still going to college). The memories became so vivid, that I even very clearly remembered what Vicki and Shirley's

rental looked like, inside-and-out, although Vicki did not mention the rental house in any of her letters. Her return address was on the envelope and that might have helped. But it also appears that memories bring back other memories. Also, these were handwritten letters. I think that being able to see and touch the

words that she wrote with her own hand so many years ago might have had a role in what I experienced. I am not sure that reading these letters in a typed-form would have had the same effect. A day after reading the letters from 56 and 57 years ago, I started thinking about the sequence of events that led to the experience I had the day before.

First, I had actually kept those letters. Then, my mom had found them among some of my old belongings she was probably throwing out and decided to keep them for me; although, over the years I don't remember her mentioning them. Furthermore, they had survived a couple of moves that she made in Texas when she changed residences (purging belongings occurred each time). They then had survived two cross-country moves (Texas to South Carolina and then back to Texas). Again, purging belongings occurred each time. Finally, they came to light after so many years at just the right time to make a big and overall comforting impact on me just when I needed it.

Providential?Yes.

Divine Providence?......I believe it was.

Vicki's words to me after all these years
reminded me of why I loved her so much,
and still do. The best kind of memory to have.

We received a heart transplant call so I had to go into work at 913pm.

The patient a 32 year old man had arrhythmia's that had effected his heart so much he needed a transplant. We were transporting this patient to the OR, he had his eyes closed the whole way. When we got into the OR everyone started introducing themselves to him, Stephen whispered to me "please don't take offense but I'm going to keep my eyes closed until I'm asleep, my anxiety is high enough already I don't need to see what's happening".

I said would it be ok if I just held your hand until you go off to sleep then, he said please do!

Stephen and I held hands for about 40 minutes, he'd squeeze, I'd squeeze back to let him know I was there. We prayed together the whole time.

Fast forward to the next morning about 9am. Stephen is recovering in ICU, the breathing tube is out. I knocked on the door & walked in



his room, he was visiting with his wife. I said "Good morning, I wanted to check how you were feeling". Stephen stopped speaking, looked at me looked back at his

wife, and said "this is the angel I was telling you about, I wouldn't have made it through the surgery without her". Then he proceeded to grab my hand and explain to his wife how I was his eyes and ears while he was terrified and anxious.

She teared up and asked, "Stephen how do you know this is her?" He replied, "I will NEVER forget her voice, my angel".

Kaitlyn has since made his family apple cider donuts, I brought him brown sugar for his hospital oatmeal, and his wife and I have exchanged numbers. We're in this together through Christ!
